The following year he was an active service aboard HMS "Repown" in the Grand Fleet as a Bugler, Royal Marines, Light Infantry. By 1919 he had won the Kings Badge and at the First Royal Tournament, Earls Court, was selected to accompany His Royal Highness, Prince of Wales, on his tour of the West Indies, Australia and New Zealand. The extremities of the

Australian expedition took the party from Broome to Perth, Koolgardie, Adelaide, Melbourne, Sydney, Cairns and eventually placed John beside Billy Hughes and H.R.H. at the laying of the foundation stone in Canberra. For service to the "Crown" he was awarded the Royal Victoria Medal - a silver gong. Not a bad start for a lad in his mid 20's.
